PhD Thesis

My thesis research concerned the cultural ramifications of societal changes and federal oversight of Hollywood between 1946 and 1961. My thesis examines 12 Hollywood Christmas films from this 15-year period to identify and analyze changes within the genre and film industry as they relate to and reflect changes in the wider US cultural, social, economic, and political moment. Ultimately, my thesis exemplifies how susceptible Hollywood was to myriad pressures – including from the federal government – and how, as a result, the cultural content of those Christmas films developed new strands of the genre that embraced more socially conservative messaging and veered away from more traditional Dickensian and Santa-specific tropes.
